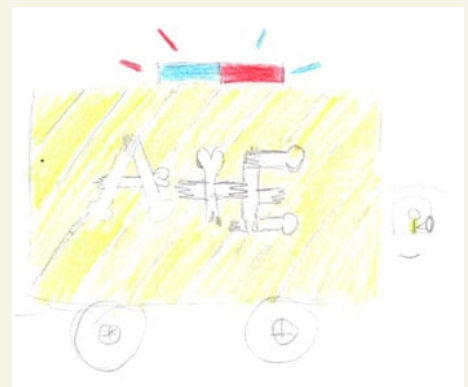

DR KARIN SCHWARZ

Head of School of Paediatrics for Yorkshire and the Humber

Originally born and raised in Germany, I have been working in the UK since I graduated from medical school. Love and the opportunity to do Paediatrics kept me in Yorkshire and I have in the past worked in many of the hospitals in the East and West (but sadly not the South) of the area.

Since 2001 I have been working as a Consultant Paediatrician at Huddersfield and Halifax and locally I am the lead clinician for neonates.

I have always had close involvement with trainees and training as rota organiser, college tutor and supervisor. During my time as TPD between 2009 and 2015 I have developed the ARCP process and have established exams related courses in the region. I have been lucky enough to be appointed Head of School of Paediatrics in June 2015 and I greatly enjoy this role. It is a pleasure to work with all the trainees, TPDs, HEE team and trainers in Yorkshire and nationally. One of our current main areas of work within the school is preparing for the forthcoming shape of training changes to ensure our trainees can access the best training possible.

Outside work I spend time with my husband and 4 children, act as the children's taxi driver, stand at the side of football pitches and drag everybody out of the house for long walks, which the dog and I enjoy the most. I also try to keep fit by running (not very far) and playing tennis (unfortunately not very well).

DR BOB PHILIPS

Senior Clinical Academic at CRD, and an Honorary Consultant in Paediatric / Teenage-Young Adult Oncology at Leeds Children's Hospital

His main areas of work are in the development of individual participant data (IPD) meta-analysis, supportive care management, and the development of skills in appraisal and translation of clinical research in practice. He is the lead of the PICNICC collaboration, "Predicting Infectious Complications In Children with Cancer" which was formed by engaging international clinical and methodological experts, parent representatives and healthcare researchers to investigate primarily the patterns of risk in febrile neutropenia. Bob was the Clinical Lead for the NICE Guideline (CG151) on the management of neutropenic sepsis.

Bob has worked extensively to promote and teach evidence-based practice with the Centre for Evidence-based Medicine in Oxford, UK, and also the Centre for Evidence-based Child Health (Institute of Child Health, London, UK). He edits the evidence-based practice sections of the Archives of Diseases in Childhood, and is an associate editor of the journal. He has lectured in the UK, Europe, North America, Australia and the Nordic Countries on the subject of evidence-based practice, and has written widely on this.



DR ABDUL SHAMEEL MATTARA

Consultant General Paediatrician at Calderdale and Huddersfield NHS Foundation Trust.

He graduated in medicine from South India and underwent run through Paediatric training at West Yorkshire. He became a Consultant in 2015. He has been a fellow of RCPCH since 2019. He has also got experience at working in Newcastle, Hull, Wirral, Ormskirk, and Rotherham at different levels of responsibilities. He worked as designated clinical lead for neonates at Rotherham General hospital for 3 years. He has particular interest in Neonatal and Respiratory medicine. He is currently the designated doctor for child death at Calderdale and Huddersfield NHS Foundation Trust. He is passionate about digital innovations in Paediatric specialities to enhance patient care.

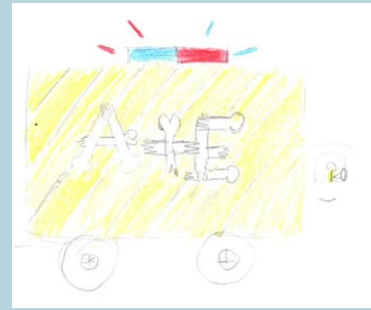

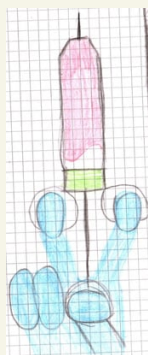

OPPORTUNITIES



Senior Paediatric Regional Advanced Training

To follow on from the enviable regional teaching programs of STEPP & PGDip, HEE Yorkshire & Humber Paediatrics offer **SPRAT**. Level 3 teaching requires a focused approach to support the development of skills required for consultant life. The current SPRAT program has been mapped onto RCPCH Progress curriculum for Level 3s, aiming to address learning objectives in preparation for START. We recognise there is an on-going desire for clinical content however, and each SPRAT day now also includes a 'clinical update' from relevant specialties. We have also embedded bi-annual Safeguarding days (February & September) into the program making attainment of Level 3 safeguarding competencies more achievable.

We are focused on making SPRAT accessible, to complement the life & training of senior registrars, so have streamlined teaching to either the last Tuesday or Thursday of the month.^{*} Booking onto study days is no longer required, and all teaching & resources can be accessed via **Blackboard**, making attendance more flexible & opportunistic for changing clinical demands.
